## Dolores Huerta to celebrate mural in Modesto on January 11

Dolores Huerta, legendary activist and co-founder of the United Farm Workers' movement, will speak at the celebration of a new mural featuring her image, as well as Cesar Chavez and a farm worker. Artist Joel Aguilar created the mural for the Modesto

Peace/Life Center at 829 13th Street. The mural embodies the spirit of activism for justice and honors workers. The celebration will be at 12:00 noon on Thursday, January 11, at the Teamsters Local 948 Union Hall, 1222 I Street, Modesto.



Dolores, founder and president of the Dolores Huerta Foundation, was inducted into the California Hall of Fame in March of 2013. She has received numerous awards: among them The Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Award from President Clinton in 1998, Ms. Magazine's One of the Three Most Important Women of 1997, Ladies Home Journal's 100 Most Important Women of the 20th Century, and nine Honorary Doctorates from universities throughout the United States.

In 2012, President Obama bestowed upon Dolores her most prestigious award, the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the United States' highest civilian award.

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#### Building Bridges, Not Barriers: Forging a Future of Linguistic Unity and Cultural Celebration

What's good, Community?

Coming at you with some real talk from the vibrant streets of Stanislaus County. I'm Karlha, your local advocate with a heart that beats to the rhythm of our barrio. As a daughter of the soil, raised by parents who turned the fields under the Cali sun into a life for my family, I have a story to tell. It's about living in a place where your language can feel like a wall, not a bridge. My folks, like many of yours, faced this world with Spanish on their lips, and too often, they weren't heard.

Our hood's rich in languages, but check this: nearly half our fam speaks something other than English when we're kicking it at home. And a hefty slice of that is en Español. But it's deeper than numbers — we're talking about lives, dreams, and hustles getting lost in translation. Our struggle? It's bigger than just a call for language access; it's a push to make sure our people feel seen, respected, and part of the county convo. We're fighting to stitch a community quilt that's as colorful and diverse as we are.

So how we gonna break down these walls and throw a block party that everyone's invited to?

- 1. Hit the Pavement Together: We gotta link up and push for change that gets everyone speaking the same language of access and opportunity in our services. Unity is our strength.
- 2. Get the Word Out: Share the stories, light up the 'gram, talk it up in the streets. Every chat we spark, every experience we drop it's all about building that momentum.
- 3. Dive into the Mix: Roll up to the town halls, be the energy in the initiatives, and rock the movements that champion our languages and cultures.

Reflecting on the grind and the hustle of my own roots, I see us building something big here – a future in Stanislaus where no language is a barrier and every culture gets its shine.


## StaniStory: Change and Continuity in Stanislaus

## Mourning the Dead, Calling for Ceasefire and an End to the Cycle of Violence

Israelis gather in Jerusalem to mourn those killed in Gaza and to call for a ceasefire and an end to the cycle of violence.

#### From Gush Shalom

**Jerusalem:** Around 100 Israelis gathered outside of the US Embassy in Jerusalem to mourn those killed in Gaza and to call for an immediate ceasefire. The vigil included a recorded message from a Palestinian who fled Gaza, written memorials about those who have been killed, poetry, music by a Gazan who was killed, and more.

"The death toll will only continue to rise if no action is taken. From our devastation for those already killed, we demand that this war end." Maya Rosen, a participant in the vigil

The vigil comes at a time when Israel is severely repressing and punishing any recognition of the suffering in Gaza or of the Palestinians who have been killed since October 7th. This most directly impacts Palestinians who have sought to mourn their family or friends, or who generally dared to speak out about the atrocities committed in Gaza. Many Palestinians across Israel have been arrested, threatened, and forced out of work for social media posts or statements. Israeli Jews have also faced repression in this crackdown.

"In the current environment, there is no space to speak to the suffering, loss, and deprivation experienced in Gaza since October 7th, and the nearly 20,000 people, the majority of whom are women and children, who have lost their lives," said Itamar Israeli, another participant in the vigil.

Those gathered came to express their pain about all victims who have perished in this war -- Palestinians and Israelis -- and to demand an immediate ceasefire, at the doorstep of the US Embassy and down the street from Benjamin Netanyahu's residence.

In coordination with the vigil in Jerusalem, some 25 parallel vigils are planned across the world this weekend, including in New York, Chicago, Boston, Pittsburgh, Toronto, London, and Zurich.

#### Statements from attendees:

Erez Bleicher, from the vigil's opening statement: "We are here to publicly grieve the 20,000 Palestinians lost in the Gaza Strip, to personally mourn our friends killed in the airstrikes, to bring their living memories and the fact of their death to the doors of those responsible, and demand a permanent ceasefire now. Joe Biden and Benjamin Netanyahu, we are standing in direct sight of the US embassy in Jerusalem and meters from the Prime Ministers' house because we hold you and your governments directly responsible for the 20,000 Palestinians killed and the ongoing mass expulsion of Gazan. We are here determined to publicly honor their memory and in the hope that this memorial can be even a fragile shelter for the many thousands of Gazans who have been lost. We demand the right to publicly mourn them as we simultaneously grieve

Israeli members of our communities killed on October 7th. We will not allow our profound grief for the 1200 Israelis who have been killed to justify more death. We know that the only way to end this collective anguish is to build a future of mutual prosperity beyond occupation, closure, airstrikes, ground invasions, and massacre."

**Abigail Szor:** "There are no winners in war. I am here today because there are names, faces, and stories to those killed in Gaza. I have friends there who have lost many relatives in this horrible and painful war. My good friend lost her mother, and I am speaking here, because she cannot speak, because her words would endanger her life. The

to determine the fate of an entire people, to seek revenge, to kill and be killed and through this bring victory is flawed and mistaken. The choice stands before us whether to continue to sacrifice many lives and to bring more death and loss or to agree to a political solution

idea and the policy according to which it's possible

which is the only way we can ensure true and stable justice, security, and calm. Beyond political faith, what guides me, perhaps more than ever, is

my friendship with my friend from Gaza. This alone is sufficient to unequivocally make clear to me that this reality need not be our destiny. This war is terrible and will not bring about a solution or victory for anyone. My only hope is that it ends immediately. We have to imagine and create a better reality in the memory of those who are no longer with us and for those who are still alive."

Yossef Mekyton: "Khalil Abu Yahia, my dear friend, a determined optimist and one of the most decent people I have ever known, was murdered, along with his entire family, in southern Gaza by an Israeli bomb. But right now the political repression is so extreme that even a simple expression of grief over a Palestinian friend who suffered so much and was murdered is cause to be fired, interrogated, judicially attacked, arrested, and fined. A society which doesn't have room for grief and sorrow over the loss of life – even if it's the life of someone who is not 'your own' – is rotten to its core. I will cry over Khalil for many years to come. Today I am taking my stand to do so also publicly, and politically."

Oneg Ben Dror: "With every day that the massacre in Gaza continues, a part of our humanity dies, too. Palestinians are being slaughtered, imprisoned, severely tortured, and hunted down simply for speaking out, expressing grief, or attempting to maintain their livelihood. It is our collective responsibility to do everything within our power to stop the genocide, ethnic cleansing, and forced displacement of the Palestinian people. Do not acquiesce to the horrific dehumanisation of Palestinian lives. We all must act now."

## **Sunny Sunol Sunday**

Sunol Wilderness Regional Preserve is an annual destination. Part of the vast East Bay Regional Park District, this park offers almost 7,000 acres of oak woodlands, grasslands, streams, and an abundance of hiking opportunities. The trailheads that are accessed from Welch Creek Road are favorites, as the limited parking means few hikers.

Paul, Russ, Monica, and I first headed to the park kiosk to pick up a parking pass (\$5), but was told that due to lack of power, no pass was needed that day. Minor score! We then backtracked a couple of miles to Welch Creek Road and located the Welch-Flag Hill trailhead in the northwest corner of the park. We picked out an 8-mile route with approximately 2000 feet of elevation gain.

Late October is "sticker" season, and the plants are brown and dry. Star Thistle, in particular, likes to latch on to socks and pant legs. There is a bit of Poison Oak right at the trailhead, so beware! The hike begins with a steady climb, and the trail markers point the way.

After about a mile, we reached the first junction and took the Loop trail up to Flag Hill. A bench at the summit allowed us to catch our breath and take in the views. Mission Peak

(another fun hike accessible from Sunol) is to the west. The park's main parking lot is in the valley to the south, with Calaveras Reservoir in the distance.

After our brief rest, we continued on Flag Hill Road and headed toward High Valley Camp. We passed oak trees, their leaves still green and glossy. California Buckeye leaves dropped months ago, and their large seeds dangle like Christmas ornaments. Bay trees added their spicy fragrance. As we dropped down toward the barn at High Valley Camp, we heard coyote howls. The gullies and thick vegetation provide lots of habitat for these critters. One of the several old-style rock and wood board signs pointed the way to the picnic area.

The barn is part of the JB Ranch, established in 1939 by Willis Brinker. The ranching legacy lives on here, and it isn't hard to imagine a busy cattle operation with cowboys on horses managing the ranging bovines. Nowadays, there are picnic tables, trash cans, and outhouses. The drinking fountains do not have water, so hikers must bring all necessary liquids.

After lunch, we backtracked a bit to Cave Rocks Road and had a muscle-stretching climb for about a mile. We passed a small pond on our left. We turned left at Eagle View Road, which soon turned from a gravel road into a narrow trail. The vegetation becomes more lush as we enter





a narrow canyon with a dry stream. A short segment of stairs takes us up to the ridge. The trail is narrow here, so hiking poles will come in handy.

At Vista Grande Road, we turned left to complete the loop back toward High Valley. We began our descent, and I was happy to have my hiking poles on the gravel slip-and-slide road. Maguire Peaks, with their angling sedimentary layers, come into view on our right. A cluster of pumpkin-colored oak galls catch my attention and reminds me of mini jack o'lanterns. As we approached High Valley, we saw a group of Black Walnut trees. I wondered if they were planted for their nutritious nuts or if they are part of the native flora.

After about a mile, we turned right at High Valley Road. In half a mile, we are on Welch Creek Road. We walked under the oak and cottonwood canopy watching out for vehicles on this narrow, winding, one-lane road. After one mile, we came to our vehicle, shook off the stickers, and headed for home.

Getting there — About 70 miles, 1 hr. 20 min. drive time. From Modesto, go north on Highway 99, then head west on 120/205/580. Near Dublin, go south on Highway 680. Take the Highway 84 West/Calaveras Road exit. (Note: there was a lot of construction on the highways when we were there in October 2023. Watch out for confusing road signs!) Turn left at the exit, then right on Calaveras Road. After a few miles, turn left at Geary Road. Soon, you will see the park kiosk. Pay \$5 parking fee, then turn around and head back to Welch Creek Road.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration Committee again invites you to our 30th Annual Martin Luther King Jr. Commemoration on Saturday, February 10, 2024. Civil Rights attorney Maya Wiley will speak at Modesto Junior College's Performing Arts & Media Center, 435 College Ave., Modesto at 7:00 p.m.

There will be inspirational music, spoken word, and the awarding of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Legacy Award to retired Modesto High School teacher and founder of the annual Day of Respect, Sharon Froba.

Our keynote speaker, Maya Wiley, is the president and CEO of The Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and The Leadership Conference Education Fund. A nationally respected civil rights attorney, Wiley has been a litigator at the ACLU, NAACP Legal Defense Fund, and



the US Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York. She has created programs in philanthropy, non-profits, government, and higher education. She helped create a criminal justice program for a major foundation in South Africa.

Wiley became the first Black woman to be Counsel to a New York City Mayor, Bill de Blasio, where she worked to protect and expand civil rights, Minority and Women-Owned Business contracts, and broadband access.

Maya Wiley has received numerous awards and has been a public voice for rights, justice, and democracy through written opinion editorials and as a former legal analyst for NBC News and MSNBC.



As of Wednesday, a U.S.-based Quaker group's online <u>database</u> listed over two dozen companies profiting from the bloodshed in the Gaza Strip, where Israeli forces have spent the last 10 weeks waging what experts call a "<u>genocidal</u>" war that <u>sent</u> defense stocks soaring.

Backed by \$3.8 billion in annual military aid from the United States, Israel declared war on October 7 in

retaliation for a Hamas-led attack that killed over 1,100 people. Since then, Israeli forces have killed over 20,000 Palestinians in Gaza—sparking massive protests demanding a cease-fire around the world, including many led by Jewish people.

The growing death toll, displacement, destruction of civilian infrastructure, and difficulties in delivering humanitarian aid to the besieged enclave have also increased scrutiny of a \$14.3 billion package for the war that the Biden administration requested from Congress as well as criticism of the U.S. weaponmakers and billionaire donors

who are <u>arming and enabling</u> the Israel Defense Forces (IDF).

"The scale of destruction and war crimes in Gaza would not be possible without massive weapon transfers from the U.S.," said Noam Perry of the American Friends Service Committee (AFSC), the group behind the tool, in a statement Wednesday. "As global resistance to war and apartheid grows, it is important that the public know exactly who is making this violence possible."

As the AFSC webpage details:

Shortly after October 7, the U.S. government started transferring to Israel massive amounts of weapons. Among these weapons, Israel <u>received</u> more than 15,000 bombs and 50,000 artillery shells within just the first month-and-a-half. These transfers have been deliberately <u>shrouded in secrecy</u> to avoid public scrutiny and prevent Congress from exercising any meaningful oversight.

Some of these weapons were purchased using U.S. taxpayers' money through the Foreign Military Sales program; some were direct commercial sales purchased through Israel's own budget; and some were replenished U.S. military stockpiles in Israel, which the Israeli military may also use. A list of known U.S. arms transfers is maintained by the Forum on the Arms Trade.

The webpage notes that the list is based on reporting, social media, and other open sources, and "focuses on weapons used by Israel because all Palestinian militant groups are already sanctioned and receive no support from Western governments or corporations."

For example, Boeing, the world's fifth-largest weapon

manufacturer, makes F-15 fighter jets and Apache AH-64 attack helicopters used by the Israeli forces, as well as "multiple types of unguided small diameter bombs (SDBs) and Joint Direct Attack Munition (JDAM) kits" that have been used "extensively" during the war, including in a bombing of Gaza's Jabalia refugee camp.

After decades of Israeli occupation forces using Caterpillar's armored D9 bulldozers to "demolish Palestinian homes and civilian infrastructure in the occupied West Bank and to enforce the blockade of the Gaza Strip," the machines "have been crucial in the Israeli military's ground invasion" of the enclave, according to AFSC.

While both of those war profiteers are based in the United States, the list isn't limited to U.S. firms, also calling out the world's seventh-largest weapon manufacturer, the U.K.'s BAE Systems, and Israel's largest weapon manufacturer, Elbit Systems, "one of the primary suppliers of weapons and surveillance systems to the Israeli military."

Other companies on the list include weapons giants such as General Dynamics, General Electric, L3Harris Technologies, Leonardo, Lockheed Martin, Northrop Grumman, and RTX—formerly Raytheon—as well as vehicle companies AM

General, Ford, Oshkosh, Toyota, and drone manufacturers AeroVironment, Skydio, and XTEND.

The list also targets U.S.-based Colt's Manufacturing Company, which makes firearms including the M16, and Emtan Karmiel, an Israeli firm that "delivered some 12,000 rifles" to the country's forces within a week of October 7. It also includes Israel Aerospace Industries, a state-owned manufacturer that "makes multiple weapons systems specifically for the Israeli military."

Other Israeli firms listed include Plasan, which makes the SandCat light armored vehicle, and MDT Armor, which is owned by the Israeli company Shladot and makes the David Urban Light Armored Vehicle used by the military for patrols and reconnaissance.

The other foreign firms on the list are ThyssenKrupp, the German company that built four warships for Israel, and Nordic Ammunition Company, which makes the M141 Bunker Defeat Munition, a shoulder-fired "bunker-buster" rocket.

"As a Quaker organization with a long history of work in Palestine and Israel, including in Gaza, we support a full arms embargo to both Israeli and Palestinian militant groups," Perry stressed Wednesday. "War and attacks on civilians will never bring safety or peace to Israelis or Palestinians. We need a permanent cease-fire and to work toward a just and lasting peace in the region."

## **Ukraine's Children of War**

Dear Modestans, residents of Stanislaus County, and fellow Americans, please allow me to express my most sincere and heartfelt gratitude on behalf of all Ukrainians and in particular the people from our Sister City of Khmelnytskyi. The Sister City Agreement of Cooperation and Friendship was signed in 1987, four years before Ukraine gained its independence from the Soviet Union. All my relatives, friends, former colleagues, and numerous acquaintances thank you for your unwavering support since the Russian full-scale aggressive invasion on February 24, 2022.

After almost two full years of this devastating war, Ukrainian children have been hit especially hard. According to Ukraine's human rights ombudsman, Dmytro Lubinets, close to 70% of them were forced to leave their homes and relocate within the country or abroad. This war separated children and their parents who either went to defend Ukraine or could not seek shelter abroad together with them.

Those inside the country are in constant danger due to massive Russian attacks which damaged energy systems, ruined water supplies, created loss of heating, destroyed schools, hospitals, and left explosive devices.



As reported by the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF), about 5 million Ukrainian children were dislocated from their homes, of whom almost 2.5 million had to seek safety in foreign countries. At the beginning of this year, the Prosecutor General's Office reported more than 3000 educational institutions have been damaged, with 400 totally destroyed. Tragically, this statistic has





since that report, especially in the north, east, and south of Ukraine. It is exactly where bloodthirsty Russia is bordering with Ukraine. According to the official information of the same agency, 510 children have died, and at least 1148 were wounded because of Russian artillery or air attacks.

On the Russian-occupied territories of Ukraine, thousands and thousands of Ukrainian children were forcefully stolen and carried off to all parts of Russia. Several hundreds of children just went "missing." Nobody knows what has happened to many of them. Last March, the International Criminal Court issued an arrest warrant for Putin (nicknamed PutLER in Ukraine) because of child kidnapping...could this be the reason Putin has limited his rare visits abroad to other dictatorships and undemocratic

countries...fear of arrest? The fiendish purpose of abducting children is to brainwash (often cruelly) them - to turn them against Ukraine, to lose their identity, their culture, and ultimately, lose their

Meanwhile, in Western Ukraine, my cousin Oksana's first-grade class was meeting in the basement of the school which had been turned into a bomb

shelter. It was bitterly cold in the bomb shelter not to mention very dark and dreary. A local priest saw photos of the young children studying in heavy coats & mittens. He volunteered his church's 19th-century seminary which has walls that are 5 feet thick. So, the class was moved from the dark and freezing bomb shelter and was allowed to meet above ground.

This last December 6, the children got a visit from St. Nickolas. In this photo, the class is showing off the little reindeer pillows they made for the soldiers at the front. However, in a diabolical move, the Russians sent drones and missiles to disrupt their joyful celebration with St. Nickolas. The children had to don their coats and go back down into the bomb shelters with St. Nickolas. Of course, it was not by accident that the celebration was disrupted.

The Russians have a plan to not only disrupt St Nickolas celebrations but to prevent all education from happening in Ukraine. Why else would they have destroyed so many schools? By the way, one of Russia's most popular times to sadistically send drones is during the day when the children are having their nap/rest time. While lying on their rugs, small children must listen to bombs exploding all around them. But as you can see education has not stopped no matter how much Ukraine is bombed.

I learned from my cousin that one of her six-year-olds has a father missing in action. He was wounded, but they couldn't find his body anywhere. The boy, Ostap, and his 4-year-old sister live with only their mother as their sole caretaker. I wanted to send money to ease things a little for them. So, I wired money to my cousin. She gave him the money telling him they could use it anyway they wanted to....2 days later my cousin called to tell me what the boy had decided. He had the teacher take him to the local military post—where he distributed the money to the soldiers for food & supplies. My cousin was surprised. She thought he would get something for a six-year-old, but the boy told her that the soldiers needed it to find his father and defend his country. What a lesson for us all in patriotic civility. This is a photo of Ostap — he's the boy in the middle while the class is hiding in the basement bomb shelter during an air raid.



St. Nicolas Day started with a brief respite from air raids, and the kids enjoyed the classroom located in the 19th-century seminary building with 5-foot-thick walls.

The basement is very cold, but the tea is as hot as their will to be FREE!

Russia continues to saturate the skies with deadly drones and long-range missiles. To be safer, the class goes back to the bomb shelter. These terrorists want no child to rest without hearing the air raid sirens or explosions even during the day. Cold bomb shelters and basements are very familiar to children all over Ukraine.

Plus, Putler cannot stop the learning process, even in the bomb shelter.

I am sure the next Sikorski is growing somewhere among











from the shattered glass. The other day, I asked 8-year-old Artem what he did last night, December 13, when the Ruscists attacked Kyiv with 10 Shahed Drones and 10 ballistic missiles. His answer was, "I finished reading the book in the bathroom, I had three hours." The boy started stuttering 15 months ago and is undergoing psychological treatment.

them. This teacher, Oksana, huddles her first graders to keep them warm and calm.

People of Khmelnytskyi are grateful to Modesto Sister Cities International for the huge fundraiser of \$70.000 last year. This money allowed them to keep the hospital running and the little patients warm when the Russian genocidal forces attacked and destroyed 50% of Ukraine's power grid. Thank you, Modestans!

The schools that do not have equipped bomb shelters or basements work online. The rest of the kids eagerly attend in-person learning but often must quickly evacuate to a "safe" place, as you have seen above and can see here.

Ukraine's children of war are maturing very fast. Even the small ones understand and follow the rule of two walls. My grand nephews and nieces spend many hours in many nights and days in the bathroom without windows to avoid injuries




